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St. Vincent and Sarah Fisher Center offers remote education options during pandemic

DETROIT, April 13, 2020 – In the face of an early end to the school year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, <u>St. Vincent and Sarah Fisher Center</u> (SVSF) is offering open enrollment for remote versions of both its children and adult programs.

Both programs are accepting students on a first come, first-serve basis for the duration of the Stay-at-Home directives, until SVSF is able to open their in-person classes again. Each program offers online or remote offline tutoring, depending on the needs of the student, through its team and a corps of dedicated trained volunteers, many of them retired school teachers.

While the SVSF Center team has been staying in touch with the 250 students and families in both programs over the last few weeks, it became clear that there was a need to offer an opportunity to the newly unemployed or food assistance recipients to take advantage of the available time to continue their education, said Diane Renaud, Executive Director and CEO at SVSF.

The children's program is a free, personalized, tutoring program focusing on math and reading for children in grades 1-5 as of April 2020.

The adult program is designed to assist adult students (age 18 or older) obtain their GED/High School Equivalency to provide the necessary foundational skills to help Detroit residents become more self-sufficient through education. The free program offers one-on-one tutoring sessions, personalized learning plans and provides for a social work component specifically designed to help students overcome the barriers to education.

"When we emerge from the stay-at-home order, the school year will be over and the job market is going to be more competitive than ever. We want to make sure our students have the best opportunities possible, regardless of their internet access," said Renaud.
